## Bruch's Violin Concerto October 17 at 8 p.m.

Osvaldo Golijov is one of classical music's hottest composers, known for deftly incorporating popular dance styles with traditional forms. His music has been performed across the globe, and we begin our October concert with his hit overture, *Sidereus*. Inspired by Galileo, Golijov evokes the swirling of celestial bodies and the beautiful night sky of Patagonia in this colorful tango-infused work.

Then David Kim, famed concertmaster of the Philadelphia Orchestra, joins the ASO in Max Bruch's virtuosic Violin Concerto No. 1.

We cap the evening with the music of another German Romantic, Robert Schumann. A poet, writer, pianist, and symphonist of incredible imagination and invention, Schumann reveals his penchant for memorable melodies, rich harmonies, and propulsive rhythms in his Second Symphony.



Violinist **David Kim** was named Concertmaster of The Philadelphia Orchestra in 1999. Born in Carbondale, Illinois in 1963, he started playing the violin at the age of three, began studies with the famed pedagogue Dorothy DeLay at the age of eight, and later received his bachelor's and master's degrees from The Juilliard School.

Highlights of Mr. Kim's 2015–16 season include teaching/performance residencies at Oberlin College, Bob Jones University, and The Boston Conservatory of Music; continued appearances as concertmaster of the All-Star Orchestra on PBS stations across the USA and online at the Kahn Academy; and the launching of the first annual David Kim Orchestral Institute of Cairn University in Philadelphia.

Mr. Kim appears as soloist with The Philadelphia Orchestra each season well as with numerous orchestras around the world. He also appears in tionally at festivals such as Brevard, MasterWorks (USA) and Pacific (Japan). Mr. Kim has been awarded Honorary Doctorates from Eastern University in suburban Philadelphia, the University of Rhode Island, and Dickinson College.

His instruments are a J. B. Guadagnini from Milan, Italy ca. 1757 on loan from The Philadelphia Orchestra and a Michael Angelo Bergonzi from Cremona ca. 1754. Mr. Kim resides in a Philadelphia suburb with his wife Jane and daughters Natalie and Maggie. He is an avid runner, golfer, and outdoorsman.

In November we look at two symphonic masters — first, Joseph Haydn, who sought to exploit the sonic characteristics of the solo violin, oboe, cello, and bassoon in a concerto for this unique quartet and orchestra. Stepping into the spotlight, our own Jason Posnock, Alicia Chapman, Franklin Keel, and Michael Burns will take the solos while the musicians of the ASO provide the charm and zest that makes Haydn's music so joyous.

Gustav Holst, fascinated with the cosmos and the astrology of our own solar system, devised prchestral suite with imaginative musical ritraits of the planets. Earth and Pluto are omitted, but all others from Mars, the Bringer of War, to Neptune, the Mystic, are given astounding sonic renderings using a massive orchestra.








### Asheville Symphonettes sponsor the first Vespa raffle
